Vor allem ist sie der Schauplatz eines Vermächtnisses, der die weiblichen Figuren in sich aufnehmend umso deutlicher hervortreten lässt. Gerade in ihren Rissen wird die Wand zu einer sprechenden Größe, die mehr offenbart als verbirgt. Sie ist dabei weniger ein reales als vielmehr ein imaginäres Objekt, das paradoxerweise den Zugang zur Außenwelt verschließt, zugleich aber Durch- und Ausblicke erlaubt. Einen Raum einzunehmen, sich in ihm zu positionieren, einen Ort für sich zu finden, ist für die hier vorgestellten Künstlerinnen und Autorinnen keineswegs selbstverständlich.
