Der MMPI wurde mit dem Ziel entworfen, in einem einzigen Test Messwerte für alle wesentlichen Persönlichkeitsmerkmale zu erhalten. Das Verfahren wird hauptsächlich als Screening-Verfahren zur Differenzierung psychischer Auffälligkeiten bei Personen ab 14 Jahren im klinischen Bereich verwendet. Die Bedeutung eines Persönlichkeitszuges wurde unter dem Gesichtspunkt eines im klinischen Bereich oder in der Personalauslese Arbeitenden bestimmt, der diejenigen Züge erkennen möchte, die charakteristisch für krankhafte oder in anderer Weise störende psychische Auffälligkeiten sind.
